19 January

### **James Creassy – A Man of His Time**

Lincolnshire born James Creassy was a drainage engineer, land surveyor and traveller. Jean Cannon talks about Creassy's works in England and Wales in the late 1700s and his travels in America and India based on extensive family history research.

16 February

### **Britain on Film: Rural Life**

Britain on Film on Tour is a brand new series of archive film programmes curated by the Independent Cinema Office. This special compilation of short films is an evocative exploration of the countryside of the UK, taking in our diverse and beautiful landscapes - down country lanes of the past, meandering through the dwindling customs of another era. Touching on all the technological, industrial and social changes that affected our countryside throughout the 20th century, these films evoke and encourage not only nostalgia, but also broader and more meaningful reflections on the nature of rural life and village communities in the UK today.

16 March

### **Barton Trinity Methodist Church**

Although there has been a Chapel on the Holydyke site since 1816 the present building dates back to 1860 with later significant additions in the early twentieth century. From 1960 a single Methodist Society united the three separate traditions in Barton based in the Holydyke Chapel. Rev. Nichola Jones of Barton Trinity Methodist Church outlines key events in two and half centuries of Methodism in the town, and 150 years of worship in the Holydyke Chapel. ### **A Tour Through Beverley**

This talk focuses on Beverley - a beautiful market town steeped in history. Its origins date back over a thousand years when Saint John of Beverley founded a monastery, and its importance as an ecclesiastical centre is represented by the beautiful minster and Saint Mary's Church. The town contains a wealth of architecture ranging from Medieval through the Georgian up to the present day. Paul Schofield, well known for his conducted tours of Hull and Beverley, presents an illustrated guided lecture "tour" through Beverley and its historical and architectural highlights. ### **History Walk through Baysgarth Park**

### **Barton Town Band**

Barton Town Band is one of the oldest organisations in Barton originating in the mid Victorian era. Jonathan Evison, its present chairman, will be taking us through nearly 150 years of brass banding both locally and nationally - through the band's highs and lows, questionable Edwardian sobriety, and right through to its present day 100 world ranking position and youth development programmes.

### **Lincolnshire Cases in the Elizabethan Court of Star Chamber**

Helen Good of the University of Hull's History Department shares her recent research into local cases brought before the Queen's Council sitting in the Palace of Westminster. Originally established to ensure the fair enforcement of laws against those in power, the Star Chamber became synonymous with social and political oppression.

### **Anglo-Saxon 'Productive Site' at Melton Ross**

Kevin Leahy describes how a series of metal detector finds followed by a multi-disciplinary study showed that the site had the attributes of an Anglo-Saxon administrative centre and that it must have been an important place in the fifth to ninth centuries.
